The Centerville Elks continued the tradition of dominance over the Miamisburg Vikings Friday at Holland Field. The Elks and the Vikings have met on the Varsity field five times, since 1973, and the Elks have won 69-0, 49-14, 42-0, 30-13 and last week 17-0. If you are counting that is 207-27 with an average score of 42-5.

When the offense, defense and special teams all have a good night, the result is usually a convincing win. That was certainly case with the 17-0 win over the once-defeated Vikings. The offense had a strong second half, putting 14 points on the board. The Blackshirts defense “pitched” another shutout, holding the Vikings to 205 yards. Special teams delivered a field goal, great field position with excellent punting, and 4 for 4 on kickoffs for touchbacks.

Sophomore wide receiver, Quiten Robinson, had 2 catches for 61 yards with a 52 yard touchdown. Bryce Cowgill closed out the scoring with his first touchdown reception for the year.

The offense put up 258 total yards, quarterback Drake Wells had 17 completions on 30 attempts for 184 yards and added 26 more on the ground. Emable Wakilongo was the Elks leading rusher. The Centerville offensive line has had more injuries to start the season than we can remember. Tayler Berner, tackle, and Zane Hough, guard, started for the first time. Coach Adam Taylor has done an awesome job preparing these players for battle.

The defense played another outstanding game, holding Miamisburg to a total of 205 yards. Cincinnati Bearcat commit, and GWOC leading receiver, averaging 105 yards a game, Jackson McGohan, was held to only 69 yards. The defense also kept one of the best running backs in the GWOC, Christian Davis, to 33 rushing yards.

WDTN’s Sports Director and Centerville alumnus, Jack Pohl, stopped by Centerville Stadium on Tuesday with good news. After starting the season 4-0 while out-scoring their opponents 84-20, featuring back-to-back shutouts, the Elks were honored as the Operation Football team of the week!

The Elks return home this week to take on the Northmont Thunderbolts. It’s a battle of two undefeated programs entering week 5. WDTN has also selected this matchup for the Operation Football Premier Health Game of the Week.

Northmont’s defense is ranked number one in the GWOC, only allowing 3.3 points a game. Their spread offense is also highly ranked and features talented receivers and a good quarterback. It could be one of the best games of the season and we need Elk Nation to be out in force to help the boys get it done!! **GO ELKS BEAT THE BOLTS!**

Our game is safer than it has ever been and CNBC will be running a live special on Friday night from the game. This is not only a tremendous opportunity for our district and our football program, but also for the sport of football. It's important for the world to see the efforts that are being made to keep kids safe and continue to grow our sport.

What were your top take-aways from the Miamisburg victory Friday night?

Like I said last week, we have a tough team. The game Friday night versus Miamisburg was back and forth, and very tight, for most of the night. Our coaches and players didn't flinch. They kept taking the field, and they kept attacking. Every time we came to the sideline, we got closer to our goal and finally the game was out of reach and we were able to win. It was truly a team effort. From the offense finding the endzone late to seal the win, to the special teams making Miamisburg drive the length of the field, to the defense recording their second shutout of the season, it was truly and tough, gritty, team win.

The offensive line has been hit with some devastating injuries this season. What characteristics have you seen by the team for overcoming adversity?

You're right, we have seen some injuries on the offensive line. Dealing with them has been a tribute to our coaches and players. The coaches have been creating depth at every position all year long. We had guys ready for the responsibility of starting on a Friday night and that is because they have been prepared to do so since January. Our players have also had a tremendous attitude about attacking adversity. The guys that were injured have been helping out the new starters and it's been like we gained a few coaches on the sideline in games and practice. The new starters have risen up to the challenge and are meeting it with effort and humility. Our team is doing a great job handling this adversity.

Northmont has the #1 defense in the GWOC, (3.3 avg points, 83 yards per game), what has been stressed in practice this week to move the ball?

We have to match their speed and physicality. They are going to come off the ball hard and try to create chaos for our offense. We feel great about our gameplan. We just have to execute it. Each week we are dialing more and more into our offensive identity. We must continue to take steps forward and we must attack rather than being attacked. If we block, break tackles, catch, and hold onto the ball, we will be fine.

This game has been selected by WDTN as the Game of the Week. What impact does that have as you and the staff prepare?

Game of the week, or even team of the week, doesn't really change anything about how we prepare. Our kids prepare just as hard for a scrimmage as they would for a game of the week or a playoff game. The expectation is that you give maximum effort all the time, and when you do that, it doesn't matter what day it is. You'll be ready.

Football demands a lot of time per week for the student athletes. How do they keep up with their academics and prepare for a tough opponent each week?

You're right, our sport is much more demanding on time for the student-athlete than it has ever been. There's more film to break down and the gameplans continue to get more and more intricate. Coaches, players, and opponents are all getting better each week so we have more and more work to do. We have a hard rule that we are off the field by 6:15pm each day of the week. We want our players to get out of here and go be with their families, friends, and schoolwork. We want them to have time to be a high school kid as well as a student-athlete. We do, however, ask that they find some of their free time to watch a little film and we also offer morning meetings before school so that kids can see more and more of the gameplan and scout film. Our coaches have done a great job maximizing their time with their athletes as well and we are able to cram a lot of learning into our small amount of time that we are all together each day.

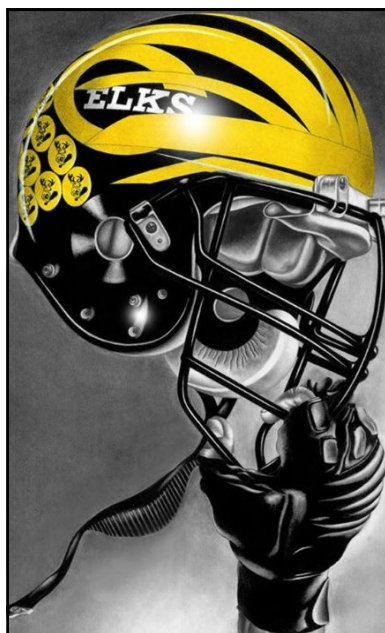
Smith threw for 131 yards with one TD and tacked on 141 yards rushing with three scores to pace Fairborn.

Keyed by defense, Northmont stays unbeaten

CLAYTON — Northmont coach Tony Broering wanted a score Friday from his defense, which had been perfect the last two weeks in preventing offenses from scoring. He kept harping on it all week in practice.

When Nigel Glover returned a fumble 48 yards in the second quarter against Fairmont, Glover remembered his coach's request when he returned to the sideline.

"I did it, Coach," Glover told him. "I did it."

Glover, a senior defensive back, scooped a fumble forced by sophomore defensive back Braylen Russell and scored the first touchdown of his career. It was one of four scores by Northmont in the first half in a 28-0 victory in Week 4 at Premier Health Stadium.

"I saw the end zone," Glover said. "I picked it up. I went back

to my baseball days. I thought it was a ground ball. That was fun. Last week, I dropped a pick-six, and I wasn't going to forget about that."

Northmont improved to 4-0 while handing Fairmont (3-1) its first loss on the opening night of Greater Western Ohio Conference play. The Thunderbolts play another unbeaten team in Week 5: Centerville (4-0), which won 17-0 at Miamisburg (2-2) on Friday.

"The GWOC is like the SEC West," Broering said. "You win a big game like this and you say, 'All right, let's have fun and celebrate,' and then you look at it and say, 'Oh my gosh, we've got Centerville next Friday night.'"

"You don't even have a minute to try to catch your breath and enjoy it."

Few teams have enjoyed the first four weeks as much as Northmont, which has outscored Butler, Richmond (Ind.), Hilliard Davidson and Fairmont 164-13. It has not

allowed a point in 15 of 16 quarters. This was its third straight shutout.

Fairmont drove into the red zone late in the third quarter only to lose a fumble, which Northmont senior defensive back Christian Pendleton recovered.

"The D line has played outstanding," Broering said. "The line-

backers have played really, really well. Brian Jones is the leader of the team at linebacker. And, of course Nigel, on the back end, has played great."

Northmont already has as many shutouts as it had in the previous six seasons combined. This was its fourth victory in the last five

seasons against Fairmont, which beat the Thunderbolts 24-21 last season.

Northmont scored all of its points in the first half, getting touchdowns on its first three possessions.

Noah McClure got Northmont on the board with a 1-yard touchdown run, his fifth of the season, with 6:54 left in the first quarter. Quarterback Cahke' Cortner scored on a 5-yard run with 1:08 left in the first quarter.

After Glover's touchdown gave Northmont a 21-0 lead with 11:04 left in the second quarter, Cortner hurdled a defender along the sideline on his way to an 8-yard touchdown run with 4:41 left in the first half.

"He jumped from the 6 to the end zone," Glover said. "He's Michael Jordan."

Cortner has six TD passes and four touchdown runs in four games. "(Cortner) worked really hard this summer to be able to do stuff like that," Broering said.

Blackshirt Defense

The 2022 Centerville defense, without a doubt, is one of the best defenses in the GWOC, in Southwestern Ohio, as well as in the state!

From 2017-2021, the Elks defense gave up 326 yards, and 24 points per game, after four games. This season, after four games, the Centerville defense has only given up 5 points, and 207 yards, on average, per game!!

After reaching to John Puckett, Defensive Coordinator, he was asked about how well the defense was playing and the origin of the Blackshirt Defense.

“They are playing at an extremely high level right now. I believe the trust amongst the players, myself, and the other defensive coaches is really strong right now. The players have built this trust through time spent together, a clear and common goal, and shared suffering. We started a tradition in 2016 of having a commitment ceremony. Every player and coach at the beginning of summer workouts will make a commitment to a daily action that will benefit the team, the defense, and themselves. This commitment is the standard in which our daily performance will be measured. Every week we get feedback from our teammates on whether or not our actions are reflective of our commitment.”

Coach Puckett continued to explain the genesis of the Black Flag: “The Black Flag came about in 2013 when a group of us coaches were talking about a mantra that we as a defensive could hang our hat on. We had quite a few Social Studies teachers on our defensive staff at that time and we had a lot of ideas floating around. On the way back from the Dublin Coffman scrimmage, Adam Taylor, said 'How about a black flag?' He gave us a run down on it's military and pirate history, and everyone agreed. We spent the rest of the bus ride and time back at school defining what the flag means and how we were going to get the players to buy in and it's been flying ever since.

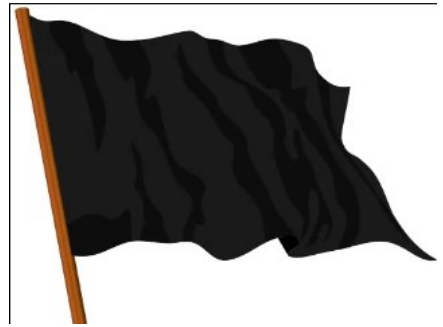
We define a black flag effort as, give no quarter; no matter the situation or circumstance we are going to choose to compete our ass off. We feel it's a great way to honor the blackshirt players and coaches who built the program. Everyone thinks of the triple option when they think of the Centerville football tradition. We talk about players like Keith Bertram, Adam Taylor, the Bradley brothers, Pat Thomas, Michael Thomas, and Greg Bell types of players that are the bedrock of The Blackshirt defense. These are guys not blessed with great natural athletic ability, but made the choice to compete like hell every day regardless of the situation or circumstance. We define a black flag effort as a relentless pursuit of attitude and effort on each play; fight for and defend every inch of the field.”

“From Coach Gregg in 1973 to Coach Ullery in 2022, the program passionately believes in attitude and effort, and the flag honors the tradition of the program's core values.”

Time Spent Together

“Every off-season in January we meet on Sunday nights to get to know one another. This started right before the 2017 season. We used to meet in my basement, but now we meet in my classroom. It's started off as leadership development meetings with seniors and has morphed into a variety of players from each class. I felt it was necessary for the players and myself to get to know one another on a much deeper level than as a player to coach. We read and discuss books, we have coaches and leaders from the community come in to lead the discussion, and we not only get to know each other on a deeper level, but the players get to know themselves on a deeper level.”

“One thing I've learned from Coach Cupps, [CHS Basketball coach] before you can lead others, you must first be able to lead yourself. There are numerous benefits from the weekly meetings, but I think the time we spend together discussing who we are and who want to be leads to a group of men that trust one another and that trust permeates throughout the team. That's all I can tell you about the meetings because the only rule we have in the group is, what's said in the meeting stays in the meeting.”

Clear and Concise Goal

“A relentless pursuit of attitude and effort every day on each play. The players are competing with extremely high effort on each play. We have been relentless from whistle to whistle during games. The players and coaches believe wholeheartedly in the Black Flag and see it as an honor to be the flag winner that week and hoist the flag on the field on game nights. Personally, I believe in the Black Flag so passionately that I have a tattoo of it on my shoulder. Our players value the responsibility that comes with being a Blackshirt and an ancestor to pass on the black flag to the players that will become a Blackshirt.”

Shared Suffering

“Tough times reveal who you really are and lets your teammates know how you are going to respond in a tough moment. Whether it's in the weight room, during pursuit drill in practice, or a family member is critically sick; you can choose how you respond. As a program we do our best to put them in tough situations to see how they will respond, and then we use it as a teachable moment. Always reminding them that it's a choice and if you don't like how you responded, make a different choice next time. If you respond the right way consistently, our team will trust you.”

“The coaches are not excluded from this as well, how do we handle situations or moments on the field, how do we handle situations at home, we always want our players and coaches to reflect on the choices we make. During the accountability meeting, you're not allowed to defend yourself when being called out , that's a lot more difficult to do than you think. Having to share the thankful Thursday text sent, it's not easy being vulnerable. Calling out your defensive coordinator during accountable meetings is not easy to do for a 15-18 year old kid. Sharing your biggest vulnerability based fear is not easy to do as a teenager especially in front of other teenagers. We believe doing these things are critical for our personal growth and crucial for the development of trust within our unit.”

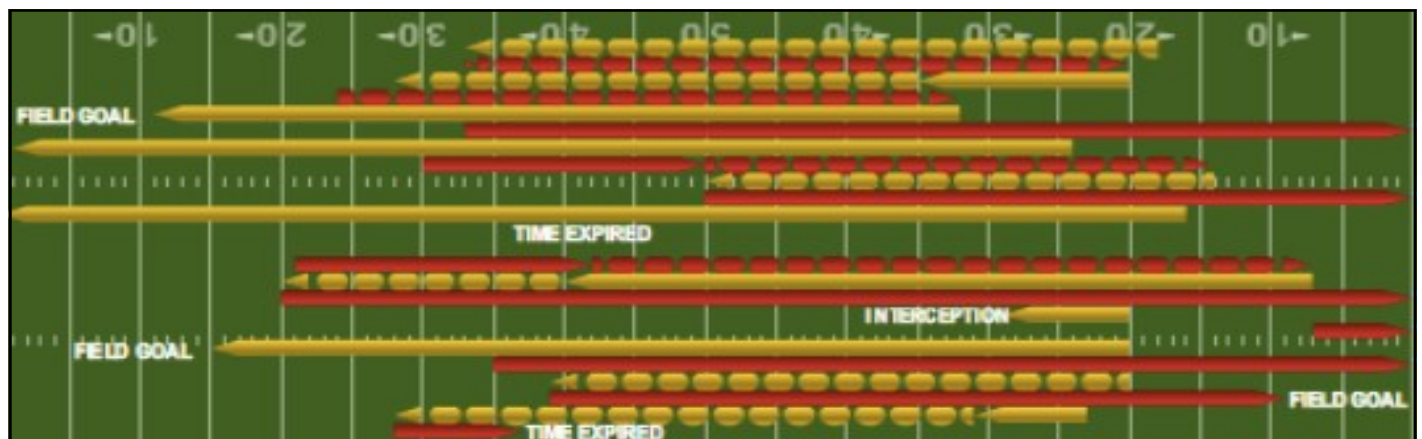

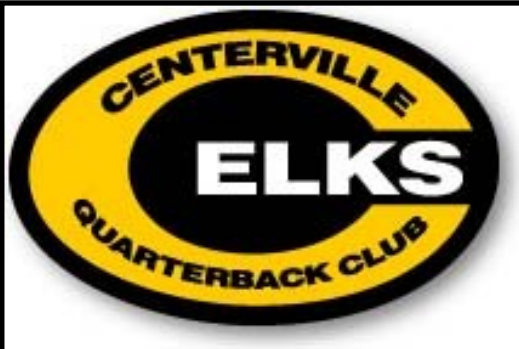
