


### Elks Shutout Birds 7-0

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Centerville and Fairmont met for the 70th time on the gridiron last Friday. The dominance continued as the Elks achieved their 55th victory in the series with a 7-0 shutout. This was a hard fought, tough battle that was decided in the final period. Sophomore defensive end, Mason Keely, sealed the victory with an interception with 1:11 left in the game.

The Black Shirt defense rose up and held an offense that was averaging 208 rushing yards to only 92 yards, an outstanding performance. Add their 48 passing yards for a total of 140, and you have one of the best defensive performances in recent seasons. Nothing is better than putting a shutout on the scoreboard and this was the Elks third shutout of the season!

Led by linebacker Jake Mullinger, with 9 tackles, the band of Black Shirts got the job done. Butler Bulldog commit, Matt Karpinsky, added 7 stops. Reggie Powers and Emmanuel Deng both had six tackles each respectively.

Fairmont's defense was tough and one of the best in the GWOC. With sophomore quarterback Braylon Newcomb making his second start, the offensive balanced attack generated 103 yards rushing and 92 yards passing which kept the Firebirds coaching staff guessing the entire night. Spreading the ball around to multiple receivers was effective. Jamar Montgomery had 4 catches, Nic Bruder recorded 3, including the touchdown, and Quiten Robinson added a couple as well. Sean Cole and Reggie Powers completed the receptions with one each. Sophomore Jacaurre Vaughn was the featured running back on the ground attack.

Another critical success factor was winning the time of possession. It is more difficult for the opponent to score when their offense is on the bench. The Elks offense had the ball for 25:19 versus 22:41 for the Firebirds. This was the only game this season where the Firebirds lost this important statistic. Special teams had another solid performance and kicker, Jackson Courville, came up just short on one of two fifty-plus field goals.

Tonight will be the 68th meeting between the Centerville Elks and Wayne Warriors. The rivalry is right up there with the most celebrated in the state of Ohio, dating back to 1956 and the Elks having the edge 34-32 with one tie.

The Fairmont game was a thriller, congratulations! How did earlier games this seasons provide experience for close battles? The game was very close. It was a very hard-fought game for both teams. They have a very sound and physical team and we appreciated the opportunity to slug it out with them Friday night. We have been in many close games this year. Playing hard in those games definitely gave our team a feeling of comfortability because they had done it before. If you're going to be a great team, you're definitely going to be in close games and you have to find a way to win them. Our players and coaches did a great job of preparing and executing.

#### What were the key turning points in the Firebird game?

First, every time our defense got a stop was a key turning point. When the offense is driving but not finishing with points, it's imperative that the defense gets stops. They did. One specific turning point was the only touchdown of the game. Our kids did a great job of executing the play and it was a great play-suggestion from our assistant coaches. Another big turning point was when the Fairmont player got a personal foul and gave us a first down. That was huge for game management. Lastly, our defense was able to get their offense behind the chains at the end. They did this through sacks and Fairmont committed a big penalty. There's a sign on the wall in our locker room that says, "5 or 6 plays decide the outcome of every game. You never know which ones they are until the game is over." We talked to our kids this weekend about rivalry games. We explained that they are one of the reasons why playing football at Centerville is so great. They want the pressure of a big game and they want to find out where they stand at the end.

If it's something we are trying to manage on a Friday night, then we haven't done our job preparing the team. We practice with intensity and emotion. We lift weights with intensity and emotion. It's another great opportunity to find out how well we prepare and how well we can play when the stakes are high. It will be exciting. We are eager for the moment and it won't be too big for any of our players.

### Elks blank Firebirds to clinch 1st-round home playoff game

KETTERING — Every Fairmont opponent devises a plan to stop the Firebirds' running game. The past three opponents - Springfield, Miamisburg, Wayne couldn't do it.

But on Friday night Centerville found a way and went home with a 7-0 Greater Western Ohio Conference victory, clinching a first-round Division I, Region 2 home playoff game.

The Firebirds (6-3, 3-3) are still fighting to be in the top eight in the region and get a home playoff game. They came in averaging 208 rushing yards, and the Elks (7-2, 4-2) held them to 93 rushing yards and 161 total yards.

"Our kids and our defensive staff prepped like crazy this week," Centerville coach Brent Ullery said. "We're familiar with each other. And I believe they know what we're going to do to defend them. And we probably executed just a little bit better tonight."

Ullery said defensive suc-

to getting on the bus, he saw a growing intensity.

"It was more like hyper focus - it was like nothing else matters," Ullery said. "Final bell rang in the school, it was like we have a job to do."

The Elks needed a big night from the defense as they continue to reinvent their offense. When starting quarterback Drake Wells was injured two weeks ago and lost for the season, Ullery turned to 5-foot-8 sophomore Braylon Newcomb. Wells was more of a passer and Newcomb is more of a runner, picking up 75 yards on 15 carries.

"We've got to continue to develop and develop the offense around him because he's different than Drake," Ullery said. "He does things really well and he has some limitations. But he's getting better every day. He's taking ownership over his play every day. He's becoming a really good athlete to have back there, and he's a game changer and gets yards when you shouldn't get yards."

"Our defensive game plan requires us to play as a team and be disciplined and do your job to spill it to somebody else that hopefully is unblocked," he said. "They did their job."

Fairmont coach Dave Miller didn't know what to say about why his offense was unable to move the ball and score like it has this season, especially the past three weeks.

"I don't know ... I don't know," he said. "Field position played a part. They did a good iob defensively. There's things that we were exposed on tonight that we have to improve on. We will."

"We just put that play in this week" Bruder said. "Braylon's a playmaker, he's able to scramble out of the pocket. (He's a) really fast guy, and everybody's running the right routes, the O line's giving him enough time and I just ended up open. It was good play."

Centerville leading rusher Emable Wakilongo is healthy but didn't have any carries.

"We're just trying out some new things on offense and using some different guys at that position," Ullery said. "He's still very much part of the game plan. We just didn't use that part of the call sheet tonight."

## Springfield opens GWOC schedule by topping Wayne, staying perfect

SPRINGFIELD - Springfield quarterback Bryce Schondelmyer sees a faster game standing in the pocket than he did playing for Division VI Arcanum. Wayne ran him down in the backfield and sacked him five times Friday night.

But the rest of the game? That wasn't too fast for Schondelmyer. He led the No. 8 Wildcats on three first-half touchdown drives and to a 21-7 victory on the opening night of Greater Western Ohio Conference play.

"There's a lot of differences obviously I've never played in an atmosphere like this," Schon-delmyer said, pointing to the stands that had been full. "And then everything happens a lot quicker. There's things you can get away with at the smaller school level that you can't get away with here."

Schondelmyer had an all-state season as a junior leading Arcanum to an 8-3 record. He threw for 3,278 yards and 45 touchdowns. He came to Division I Springfield (3-0) to compete at a higher level and show college coaches what he could do against stronger competition. On Friday he completed 21 of 29 passes for 262 yards and three touchdowns.

"He came in with a leader mindset," said wide receiver Anthony Brown, who is committed to Kentucky and caught seven passes for 108 yards Friday. "I think

that was the biggest thing for him, and all he had to do was get comfortable in the offense and do what he does.'

Schondelmyer completed 13 of 17 passes in the first half for 165 yards. Daylen Bradley caught touchdown passes of 2 and 14 yards and Shawn Thigpen caught a 5-yard TD pass.

When we go empty, I've got five weapons that I know are capable of making big plays," Schondelmyer said. "So it's not me thinking about I'm going get this guy the ball here. I'm going to find who's open and get them the ball and they understand that. We've got a lot of dudes."

Springfield coach Maurice Douglass spent the past three seasons watching Te'Sean Smoot run the offense as a passer and the team's leading rusher. It's different with Schondelmyer not being the runner Smoot was, but he likes what he's seeing from the passing game.

"He's done a good job of leading the group, and the kids love him," Douglass said.

The Wildcats have a young offensive line and are struggling to run the ball. They rushed for a combined 73 yards in the first two games and 50 on Friday. Schondelmyer is seeing defenses often drop eight defenders into

"When teams can just drop everyone in coverage it takes away a lot of our pass game, he said. "So if we can establish that run, keeps those linebackers in there, it opens up everything else. You've got to have a little bit of both."

Wayne (2-2) took an early 7-0 lead on Tyrell Lewis' 12-yard touchdown pass to Teaunn Hunter. From there the Warriors moved the ball into Springfield territory several times and got a great chance off a turnover. But they turned the ball over on downs several times, missed two field goals and didn't take advantage of Zachariah Williams' 182 yards on 27 carries.

You got to give them credit, they took advantage of their opportunities," Wayne coach Roosevelt Mukes said. "They made plays when the had to and we didn't."

Lewis, a sophomore, entered the game with over 700 passing yards in three games. But Springfield cornerbacks Aaron Scott and Tyron Barnes and safeties Tyrone Myers and Teryon Holt blanketed Lewis' receivers and held him to 67 yards and only nine completions in 32 attempts.

Scott, a 6-foot-1 junior and fourstar prospect with an Ohio State offer, had an interception and held Wayne leading receiver R.J. Mukes to one catch.

"Coach told me to follow him and make sure he didn't get the ball," Scott said.

"I think we've got the best defense in Ohio."



As a former player, coach and now parent, Wayne week has been marked on my calendar annually for over 25 years. Wayne week was always the most intense week of the football season.


The Western Ohio League conference, now GWOC, would always be determine by the Wayne/Centerville games.

1999 game. My senior year. We were both 8-0 and the top rated teams in the state. They had tons of guys committed to play D1.


The Dayton Daily News wrote a front page story about the game every day of the week leading up to the game.

# Elks plow past Warriors

Centerville's gamewinning diversion part of playbook

**HUBER HEIGHTS** — It was a lesson in smash-mouth highschool football by Centerville, with the exception of one play.

And that diversion opened up Centerville's clash with Wayne for sole possession of first place in the Western Ohio League.

On a play-action pass, J.D. Kennard caught a 37-yard touchdown pass from Ryan Hawk at the end of the first quarter to break a sevenall tie and the Elks never looked back, winning 35-14 Friday night in front of 13,000 at Wayne's Heidkamp Stadium.

"The free safety jumped up and Hawk knows if he does that, he's suppose to just throw it up," Kennard said. "The game meant every-thing in the world. We win this and we know we're No.1."

Despite Hawk's TD pass, Centerville (9-0, 6-0), No. 1 in the Dayton Daily News Division I poll, did its damage by running the ball and stopping Wayne's high-powered attack. The Elks rushed for 197 yards and four touchdowns, including three by A.J. Hawk, his longest a six yarder.

Wayne (8-1, 5-1), No. 2 in the DDN's Division I poll, entered the game averaging 39 points and 387 yards of total offense, but could muster just two touchdowns against the Elks: a 60-yard run by quarterback Derek Jones and sixyard pass from Jones to Bobby Long.

Jones completed 10-of-21 passes for 102 yards and one touchdown.

Warrior receiver John Hollins, who entered the game with the most receptions in the WOL, caught just two balls for 22 yards, one in the third quarter and the other late in the fourth.

We not only let ourselves down, but Huber Heights," Hollins said. "We owe everybody an apology."

Centerville fans owe a debt of gratitude to the Elks, who once again proved to be the Division I team to beat in the area. And Ryan Hawk proved efficient as usual, completing five-of-11 passes for 81 yards and rushing for 54 yards on

mistakes," Ryan Hawk said. "And that's Centerville football. Our defense played great and they triggered us and set the tone.

Wayne appeared to suffer from the jitters early, fumbling the ball four times in the first quarter.
"I'm proud of these kids," Cen-

terville coach Bob Gregg said. "They do the things they've got to do to be where they're at. It's not my coaching.'

Elks cornerback Jason Flowers' interception in the end zone in the second quarter led to a 14-play, 80yard drive that culminated in Adam Newton's one-yard TD run on fourth and goal, giving the Elks a 21-7 lead with 1:24 remaining until halftime.

The drive epitomized Centerville's smash-mouth philosophy: 11 of the plays were runs, accounting for 65 yards.



# Defense snuffs rally just in time as Centerville sacks Wayne, 35-27

Senior's big sack, Tamaska's 5 TDs keep Elks unbeaten

CENTERVILLE - When Wayne High School's football team came up with the onside kick, Tommy Tamaska let the thought sneak in.

"I remember last year," said Tamaska, Centerville's bruising running back, referring to a finalsecond Wayne victory. "It crossed my mind. But, I knew our defense could take care of it."

So it could. Wayne, trailing by eight points with 1:55 left, could not make a first down after recovering the kick, and the Elks held on for an emotional 35-27 victory at a packed Centerville Stadium on Friday night. A sack by Centerville senior Jameson Hartke on 4th-and-6 from the Elks' 45-yard line sealed the win.

"I'm thinking to myself that I have to make the play - I'm a

senior," said Hartke, a defensive lineman. "It's my responsibility to do something big."

Centerville (9-0, 5-0 Greater Western Ohio Conference) took control of the Eastern Division and redeemed a 21-20 loss to Wayne last season. Wayne (6-3, 4-1), which entered the game eighth in the Division I, Region 4 computer points, all but lost its chance at the playoffs.

But, it was close. Wayne, which trailed by as many as 25 points in

the first half, scored with 1:56 left on a 5-yard pass from Alex Early to Clay Westmoreland. That cut Centerville's lead to the final score and set up Hartke's big play.

"Well, 9-0 proves that they're better than they have been," said Wayne coach Jay Minton. "They fought hard, they're well coached, well disciplined."

Wayne outgained Centerville 351-338, including 349 passing yards by Early, 226 of which went to receiver Greg Orton.

But Tamaska's 221 yards and five touchdowns - which increased his season total to 32 - proved to be too much, especially early.

The Warriors scored first, on a 37-yard field goal from Brad Hemphill with 2:42 left in the first quarter. Then, even though Centerville's offense was plugged early, it flowed easily on the next four possessions, with Tamaska touchdown runs of 73, 13, 13 and 5 yards in the next 11:36. By then the Elks led 28-3.

Centerville's defense held Wayne to 134 yards in the first half, 71 of which came on a touchdown pass from Early to Orton that cut Centerville's lead to 28-10 with 3:24 left before the break. The Elks intercepted Early twice in the half.

Wayne scored 17 second-half points, but Centerville made the big play when needed.

# Elks down GWOC rival Warriors

Centerville wins fourth straight with 21-13 defeat of Wayne; Elks rush for 274 yards.

CENTERVILLE — The Centerville High School football team has two losses and is still iffy for the playoffs. But coach Ron Ullery would like to see what his team could do if put in the Division I playoff bracket.

"How good of a football team do we have? We potentially have a good football team," Ullery said. "I think we have a very good football team. I'd like the chance to play anybody with this team.

Centerville proved it continues to be one of the area's best by rushing for 274 yards and topping Wayne, 21-13, on Friday night in the Dayton Daily News Game of the Week. Centerville (6-2, 3-0), which entered the game No. 3 in the DDN area poll, has won four straight since consecutive losses to Northmont and New Jersey's Don Bosco Prep.

Wayne (5-2, 3-1), which also maintains a shot at the playoffs, was the area's toprated D-I team and drops to second behind Centerville in the Greater Western Ohio Conference Central Division.

Centerville scored the de facto clinching touchdown with 4:34 left on a 1-yard run from junior quarterback David Fleming to win arguably the area's best bigschool matchup for the second time in the past three regular seasons. Wayne topped Centerville twice last season, including in their playoff matchup.

"It's exhausting to play in a game like this," Fleming said. "You know every time you have the ball, you have to do something with it."

Centerville scored touchdowns on its first two possessions - a 1-yard run from junior James Cravens and a 2-yard Cravens run - to take a 14-0 lead with 6:20 left in the first half. Wayne then drove 73 yards to cut Centerville's lead to 14-7 on a 20-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Ryan Bitsko to Joe Gilford with 2:00 left in the half.


After a slow second half offensively, Centerville used Fleming's touchdown to take a 21-7 lead. Wayne responded by going 67 yards in eight plays, and a 4-yard scoring run from junior Troy Gilmer set the final tally.



# THE SACK MACHINE

ENTERVILLE — In an instant — or sometimes longer — Sean Fickert maneuvers past an offensive lineman.

Moments later, another quarterback hits the turf.

Whether it's football, hockey or robotics engineering, Fickert has no off switch. The 5-foot-11, 195-pound Centerville senior defensive lineman is a first-year starter chasing a 25-year-old record.

Unlike the numbers on the Greater Western Ohio Conference Web site, the Elks' coaching staff reviews tape for its stats. According to those, Fickert has 13 quarterback sacks through eight games. The school record is 19 set in 1983 by Matt Bradley.

"We knew he was going to be a very good speed guy," Centerville coach Ron Ullery said. "He's surpassed anybody's expectations. ... He's a very good football player. He plays each play very, very hard. His motor never stops."

#### Sack attack

Fickert had 4.5 sacks last week against Northmont QB Chase Belton — a candidate for GWOC Central offensive player of the year. Next on alert is Wayne's Tony Peters during today's 7:30 p.m. game at Centerville Stadium.

"Sometimes I watch myself on film and say, 'Did I actually do that?' "

### Centerville-Wayne: A kinder, gentler rivalry?

Wayne football coach Jay Minton is 6-5 against Centerville. The Elks' Ron Ullery is 3-6 against Wayne, but has won the past two and been part of many more Centerville wins through the years.

But both coaches say that the series is healthier and more sportsmanlike than ever.

"Part of this rivalry (history) has been hatred," Minton said. "We've been fighting to make it a thing where there's respect and handshakes at the end."

Ullery agrees.

"It's true, it was that way," he said. "I don't think it's any less of a rivalry now. It's just as intense and heated as before, but in a good way. Before, it took some

Fickert said. "I felt like I was being blocked by one guy and I'm going through or around three or four.

"A sack comes from just doing your job and having everyone else on the defense do their job. When that chance comes, take it."

"I'm pretty much not the best stick-handler," Fickert said. "I get it to the people who can shoot. I stand in front of the net, screen the goalie and hope he doesn't see (the shot).

"It's frustrating having somebody

hack at you all day long, but you've got protective gear to save you. And you hope you have an opportunity to hit them right back."

Ullery said Fickert brings his hockey mentality to football and vice versa. "I think (football players) bring a lot to the ice, that real aggression to hockey, which helps some of their teammates play that way — that work ethic," Ullery said. "He's their leader."

Fickert does well in school, where he's long had an interest in engineering. His three-person robotics team — Fist Full of Steel — has a competition next Thursday.

#### **Robot blitz**

He hopes this year's Bot does better than last year. The competition involves seeing who the best driver is and also a portion in which the robots battle head-to-head.

"We definitely have a lot of better, newer robots that we've been working on over the summer and all year," said Fickert, whose team has a robot with a rear drum designed to chew up the sides of its foes.

His team's Bot seems a little like Fickert — a nonstop motor in search of his next RB (robot) sack and a team win.

"Maybe if we hit a robot at the right spot, it will flip it," Fickert said. "You get the most points for immobilizing the other robot."

### Classic Rivalry Game Memories

As long as I can remember, Wayne week always meant more to me and my brothers. From the time I was in Wee Elks, to now as an alumni, I've always held this week in my mind as hallowed ground. We always say that we treat each week and each opponent with the same level of preparation and energy, but deep down we all know that this game always receives a little more attention, a little more love. This is the game we thought about during forty-four forties, championship workouts, and grueling preseason conditioning sessions. When you felt like you couldn't

go anymore, you would think of the men to the left and the right of you, and you would think of Week 10 and the men in red across from you.

Usually, we associate rivalries with hatred and little respect for our opponents. However, I did not grow up hating our rivals to the north. Over time, I found that I respected them more than any other team on our schedule. Why? Because consistent excellence and determination from our opponents over the years had earned my respect. Before my time as a Man of Centerville, I watched from the bleachers as power struggles occurred between the two most distinguished programs in the Dayton area, watching as my heroes either prevailed or came up short on the fields of not-so-friendly strife. The feeling of joy after a Wayne week win was always a little sweeter, and the feelings of bitterness always stuck around until the following year whenever we were given another opportunity to win against the Warriors.

I'll fast forward to my senior year, the 2014 season. The stage was set, the cameras were ready, and it felt like the Dayton area was holding its breath for the last game of the regular season, the best game of the season was finally here. Dramatic effects had risen to an all time high, Wayne was undefeated and we were undefeated. This game was for all the marbles. Hanging in the balance was a GWOC Championship, an opportunity to get our names on the wall forever. The senior class of 2015 had not yet taken home a GWOC championship or taken a place on our sacred wall. The hour glass for our time as Men of Centerville was down to its final grains of sand, this was our last shot.

Conditions for the game couldn't have been worse. It was raining, cold, and the wind was howling. We didn't care though, we saw this as an advantage against a team that relied heavily on their passing offense, and we relished the opportunity to take it to them up front in the trenches, and on the ground. The game went back and forth for the entirety of all four quarters, exactly what you would expect from two heavyweight contenders.

The plays that stick out in my mind are the two touchdown passes that Will Vance threw during the game. One to Nate Richardson, and the other to Timmy Krapfel. To this day, I've never seen two more perfectly placed balls, especially in the horrible conditions we were playing in. I have to give Timmy some credit though, as his catch was one of the best I've ever seen. It was over an opponent that was bigger than him and he was committed to the University of Michigan, if that doesn't scream Man of Centerville, I don't know what does. I also have to give credit to our offensive line, we fought our asses off every play. Finally, saving the best for last, the Black Shirts. Our defense was on fire during this game, holding one of the best offenses in the state to just 14 points.

The clock struck zero in the 4th, the scoreboard read "Elks-19...Warriors-14." Tears of joy filled my eyes, my voice was hoarse from all the yelling, and my body had paid the price from four quarters of the most physical game I have ever played in. Our sideline sprinted to meet our defense on the field and we celebrated like hell. We lifted our trophy, took one final lap around our field, and secured a spot on the sacred wall forever. We had paid the price year after year, and we had finally earned what we had longed for since our first day as Men of Centerville.

### Wayne, Centerville renew rivalry

Winner will take the GWOC Central Division title.

It's been 30 years since Wayne and Center-ville were each 9-0 and were matched in a Week 10 high school football game. And if you ask any of the anticipated crowd of 9,000 expected for Friday's showdown, it was worth the wait.

Centerville (9-0) will host Wayne (9-0) at 7 p.m. on Friday. It'll decide the Greater Western Ohio Conference Central Division title and bragging rights for the area's two est Division I programs. Both are among the

state's top-ranked teams and have clinched playoff berths. Both should host first-round games in next week's openers.

Centerville also hosted Wayne in 1984 when both were 9-0. Centerville won that game, 28-20.

The long-running ri-valry essentially began three seasons earlier. First-year Wayne coach Mike Schneider inherited a program that was 0-10 in 1980. But late in the 1981 season, the War-riors snapped the Elks' 53-game Western Ohio League win streak, scoring the winning TD on a quarter.

"That really started the whole thing," reflected

Schneider. Centerville won in 1982-83, then came the unbeaten showdown in 1984. Like this season, interest in that game 30 years ago kept mounting as the season progressed. Lance Schneider,

Mike's son who's now the head coach at Northmont, was Wayne's senior quar-terback. When they ar-rived at school on Tuesday morning that week the craziness for tickets

had begun. "We rolled up there about 7:15 (a.m.) and there was a line as far is you could see down as you could see down Chambersburg Road," re-called Lance. Wayne's allotment of 2,500 tickets was sold out

in an hour.

That game featured familiar player and coach-ing lineups. Centerville's QB was Dave Miller Jr., now the head coach at Covington, Among his teammates was Keith Ber-tram, an assistant coach most recently at Fair-mont. Former Center ville head coach Ron Ullery was an assistant then to Elks head coach Bob Gregg. Wayne's other key play-

ers were Roosevelt Mukes and Aaron Powell, both current Warriors assis-

tants for head coach Jay Minton. Also on Wayne's staff back then were top assistants Pat Wood and Mike Garinger, both of whom still hold those positions under Minton.

Wayne led the 1984 game at halftime. Lance Schneider threw a couple third-quarter picks, one of which was returned for the clinching touchdown. "Just like this year, ev-

erybody figured these were the two best teams and it was going to come down to Game 10," said Mike Schneider, an assistant at Northmont since

leaving Wayne. "That's exactly the way it went." Every Wayne/ Centerville game from 1981-90 would decide the WOL title.

In 1999, both teams took 8-0 records into a greatly anticipated show down at Wayne. Centerville won that game 35-14 before an estimated 13,000-plus fans in an overly stuffed Heidkamp Stadium, Huber Heights city officials and its fire department have instruct ed the Wayne administration to never again allow that many spectators into the stadium.

That's just one of many top regular-season ending games on Friday, That includes the 50th anni-versary of the Alter (9-0) vs. Chaminade Julienne (5-4) series at Springboro and Twin Valley South (7-1) at Miami East (8-1). Kenton Ridge (8-1) is at Tippecanoe (8-1) to decide the Central Buckeye Conference Kenton Division. Also, Greeneview (9-

O) goes for a perfect reg-ular season at Mechanicsburg (7-2). Marion Local (9-0) can do likewise at Delphos St. John's (4-5) as can Tri-County North (8-0) at National Trail (5-4).

The regular season ends on Saturday. The Ohio High School Athletic Association will announce first-round playoff pairings on Sunday afternoon

There was Jeff Harris, her freshman boyfriend of five weeks, standing four rows above her in the crowded end-zone bleachers. his jacket and shirt stripped off, a big red Y painted neck to belly button on his bare chest. Next to Jeff, on a night when temperatures dipped just a few degrees above freezing, were seven other shivering bare-chested guys who helped spell out "W-A-Y-N-E . . . 9-0!"

"Oh look at him, he's just so cute," McKittrick squealed. And when Jeff looked her way, she mouthed the words "I love you sooooo much!" Then to no one in particular, she pronounced, "Oh. what a great night this is!"

A great night indeed.

Regardless of the score and the

stats — Centerville overpowered Wayne, 35-14 — this was a romantic night for anyone who loves high school football. There hasn't been a Friday night football scene like this around Dayton for a long,

long time. Centerville is 9-0 and seems almost certain to win the Western Ohio League. Wayne is now 8-1 and will end up in the playoffs as well.

More than 13,000 fans crammed into the stadium that is said to

hold 7,500. That meant fans were six deep around the end-zone fenc-

"I wouldn't want to be anyplace else in the world tonight than right here," said Dennis Dillon, who was lucky he wasn't anyplace else because his face was also painted red and black and he was wearing a massive Indian headdress.

Across the field, Centerville assistant coach Bob Brigati agreed: "This is what high school football is all about. It doesn't get any better than this."

He was right:

From the 60-yard touchdown run of Wayne quarterback Derek Jones, complete with a 360-degree spin move around a defender at the Centerville 10-yard line, to the 37-yard touchdown pass by Centerville's Ryan Hawk

to J.D. Kennard that faked out every defender, you had spectacular plays. There was rugged running by the Elks' Ray Huston, the three rushing touchdowns by A. J. Hawk and the speed of his Wayne counterpart Earnest Tucker. And then there was that Centerville defense that bottled up the highscoring Wayne offense much of the

As the game unfolded, you understood why 22-year-old Rick Vance and his wife Angela, a 1995 Wayne grad, decided Friday night would be the football christening of their 1-year old daughter Carissa.

"This is her first game," said Rick, who works for NCR while going to Wright State. "I figured if she was going to get introduced to high school football this would be the game to do it."

It matched two-high powered teams, a healthy rivalry - Centerville has now won 11 of the last 19 and fans that like to tweak each other in good-natured fashion.

"It's a bigger rivalry for them

than for us," Centerville senior Nick Smiga said. "We have other big games.'

While he was talking, two Elks players who hadn't dressed for the game, walked in front of The Reservation, where they were booed heartily by the painted Wayne rowdies. "It just makes us want to beat them all the more," Centerville lineman Justin Sloan, sidelined with a broken leg, said as he passed.

Not far away, one tailgating Wayne fan cracked: "I hope it doesn't rain. A lot of their fans all those with their noses up would drown."

John Spiewak, who played the offensive line for Centerville in the mid-1980s and now is in sales for Pilot Corp. returned fire from his side of the stadium: "Wayne thinks they're making tradition tonight. They're wrong. They're playing tradition.

"All these years under the Centerville coaches - all those victories and big games - it's like a religion there. Back when I was playing, we used to pray before each game. We prayed to Vince Lombardi."

Over in The Reservation there was some praying going on, too. Jeff Harris and his frozen buddies could barely talk through the cold. "God I wish it would warm up," said Nolan Vannucci, who had come up with the shirtless idea.

"We thought this up when it was 70 degrees the other day," he admitted. "Our plan was to spell out WAYNE WARRIORS, but we ran out of bodies.'

Noting Vannucci and his pals were all skinny, it was suggested a few guys with beef could have displayed more than one letter.

"All our fat guys play football," Derek Menard said. "And they're good."

This was a night whether you were fat or thin, senior or freshman - as long as you wore a uniform of Wayne or Centerville you were considered special. It's why not another person could have crammed into this stadium Friday night. And it's why Crystal and Jeff left arm and arm, still in love no matter what the scoreboard said.



### Wayne - Centerville Rivalry by Jim Becker, WHS '81

Wayne began playing varsity football in 1956. They matched up against Centerville in their third game ever(1). They met again the next year in week 3, and in 1958 Wayne joined Centerville in the Little Buckeye League (LBL). The teams played annually as members of the LBL until it disbanded following the 1963 season(2). With the departure of the LBL, Wayne moved into the newly formed Western Ohio League starting in 1964. Centerville joined with other LBL teams to form the Dayton Suburban League. The schools did not play each other in 1964 or 1965, but reconvened in 1966 and 1967 on a non-league basis. In 1968 Centerville joined Wayne in the WOL.

Through 1980 the one-sided "rivalry" had been played 23 times with Centerville winning 15 (7 by shutout) including the last six by a margin of 228-36(3)(4).

In 1981, following an 0-10 season, Wayne hired head coach Mike Schneider, previously at Miamisburg. Schneider immediately turned the program around and in week 8 the 6-1 Elks, riding a 53 game WOL winning streak, came to Heidkamp Stadium to face the 5-1-1 Warriors(5). The game was an epic struggle with Centerville holding a 6-0 lead through three quarters. In the fourth quarter Schneider called for a fake punt from the Wayne 28 yard line. The resulting 72 yard touchdown put Wayne in the lead. A few minutes later they would seal the deal with an interception return resulting in the 13-6 final score.

It was with this victory that Wayne began it's ascent into one of the Dayton area's premiere programs.

Centerville would prevail the next two years, but the 1984 game was significant. The 1984 squad was Wayne's first truly great team. Led by future WHS Hall of Famers Greg Shackleford on defense and Roosevelt Mukes on offense, they dominated their first nine opponents by a combined score of 294-62 en route to a #6 state ranking. Centerville was even better, ranked #2. Centerville hosted the season ending showdown and the Warriors went into the locker room with a 14-6 lead. The Elks would take charge after halftime, scoring 22 points in the first nine minutes, winning by a final score of 28-20. The victory would put Centerville into the playoffs, the first Dayton Area Division I team to do so.(6)

Every Wayne / Centerville game from 1981-90 would decide the WOL title. Since 1985 Wayne holds the edge in the series, having won 23 of 39.

Probably the most memorable game since 1984 was the 1999 week 9 matchup of undefeateds, with Wayne under the direction of second year head coach Jay Minton and led by future NFLer Will Allen. An estimated crowd of 13,000+ packed 5,000 seat Heidkamp Stadium. (7) Center-ville prevailed 35-14, but it would be Wayne's only loss that year until the state championship game. This was the first Wayne game to be televised.

In 2005, in addition to the regular season game, the teams met in the second round of the playoffs at Paul Brown Stadium. Centerville lead comfortably in the fourth quarter, 28-10, when Wayne switched to their two-minute drill and caught fire. Alex Early threw three touchdown passes in a span of 4:19 as the Warriors shocked the Elks, 29-28.

Also noteworthy was the 2010 week 8 contest at Centerville, which was moved to Thursday night so it could be televised on ESPNU. Braxton Miller threw two TD passes as Wayne won that night. They would be victorious again four weeks later when the teams matched up in the second round of the playoffs at Welcome Stadium. The playoff game was one for the ages, a 35-34 double overtime thriller, with Wayne on the way to it's second state championship game.

The 2014 season finale featured two 9-0 teams, the first time since the 1984 game that both teams were undefeated in a week 10 matchup. Centerville prevailed at home in a freezing rain, 19-14, with Wayne turning the ball over seven times. Similar to 1999 it would be Wayne's only loss until the state championship game, their third.

As a result of the Coronavirus pandemic, the 2020 regular season was shortened to six games. Wayne traveled to Centerville in week 3 and pulled out a 28-23 victory on a Cam Fancher 35 yard TD pass to Bryan Kinley with 14 seconds left in the game. Four weeks later, Centerville visited Wayne in a first round playoff matchup. The teams were tied 7-7 at halftime, before Wayne pulled away in the second half for a 20-10 victory.

Most recently, fans at the season ending 2021 contest saw the Warriors put on a rushing clinic. Bryan Kinley went for 221 yards, (214 in the first half), and Jordan Ward nearly matched him with 184. Each had 3 rushing touchdowns as Wayne tallied 456 yards on the ground, winning by a score of 42-21. In summary, Wayne and Centerville have met every year since 1956, with the exception of 1964 and 1965. It is the longest rivalry for either school. Through 2021 the teams have played 67 times in 66 years, with Centerville holding the edge 34-32-1.

- (1) Centerville was an inaugural member of the LBL, having joined when they started football in 1948.
- (2) The LBL was composed of smaller schools. From 1961 to 1963 the other members were Carlisle, Covington, Dixie, Germantown, Jefferson, and West Alexandria. At the time Wayne and Centerville were both fairly small schools. Wayne's graduating class in 1961 was 111. Refer to Little Buckeye League
- (3) Wayne's battle cry for the 1980 game was "44 no more", in reference to CHS 44 game WOL wining streak.
- (4) Wayne's primary rival to this point was Stebbins.
- (5) The 1981 battle cry was "53 is all they'll see".
- (6) 1984 was the last year that only two teams per region qualified for the playoffs. In 1985 the playoffs were expanded to four teams per region. Refer to OHSAA Classes & Divisions
- (7) The fire Marshall was not pleased


