The Centerville Elks played the Beavercreek Beavers for the 50th meeting [since 1973], last Friday night. The result was the 48th victory, 37-6, however it came with a high cost. Junior quarterback, Drake Wells, suffered a season ending injury in the first quarter. He was running the ball and was hit hard by a Beaver linebacker. His leadership and athleticism will be greatly missed at a time when the Elks need him the most. His quarterback play improved week after week this season, and filling his shoes will be difficult.

The Elks had an even 300 yards total offense, 162 on the ground, and 138 in the air. Emable Wakilongo led all rushers with 76 yards on 10 carries, and Braylon Newcomb put up 48 yards on 6 carries. Sophomore Quarterback Gavin Monturo was responsible for two touchdowns, one on the ground and one in the air. Braylon and Gavin shared calling the signals for the Elks after Drake's injury.

Two Elk touchdowns were called back due to penalties. The number of yellow flags thrown in the last two games is an area of concern for this coaching staff.

The Centerville defense held the Beavers to only 99 total yards and one touchdown. J.J. Jean-Louis was the leading tackler with 13 tackles, and Matt Karpinsky added 11 more. Ross Coppick had a pick-six that started the Elks scoring.

The kicking duties were shared by the trio of Jackson Courville, Nick Foote, (great name for a kicker), and LeLand Gantz. Jackson punted, kicked off, had one PAT and one field goal. Nick was three for four on his extra point attempts. LeLand punted two times, and kicked off four times averaging 47 yards per kick with one touchback. For LeLand's efforts, the coaching staff awarded him with the Special Teams Player of the Week.

Next up are the #6 Springfield Wildcats, it is #5 versus #6 in the state AP poll. Head Coach Brent Ullery said this is the kind of game players love to play. It's certainly the kind of game fans love to watch. And the Elks have put themselves in a position where there will be a lot of eyeballs on the result at Centerville Stadium Friday night.

This senior class been around for the entirety of the four game losing streak to the Cats. This is one goal that every Senior wants real bad, to get a "W" against Springfield before they graduate. The Elks came close in 2020 as both teams were tied at the end of regulation forcing an overtime win for the Wildcats. Last year it was all Wildcats after the Elks jumped out to a 7-0 lead, Springfield then went to score 44 unanswered points.

This match-up is definitely the Game of the Week for the GWOC league lead and the Elks are going to need a packed house, so come out and help the boys get the win. **GO ELKS**

Inside the Headset



Every game played is like taking a test in the classroom. What did you think was the most important team lesson learned from the Beavercreek victory?

The most important thing we need to have learned is that things that may seem "small" to us as an individual, might end up being huge when you are part of a team. We told a story in pre-game about how the little things can affect the entire group. What may seem insignificant to a single person, may, in fact, end up affecting the large group as a whole. We have to prepare as if our job is the most important job on the team and we must strive to be perfect at our job. Whatever that job may be. We aren't there yet. We will never be there. We are always becoming and we have never arrived. We must continue to get better. It's our first core value. Humility. We don't know everything. We must be compelled to learn and keep improving.

How does the off-season training prepare the team for a big game against Springfield?

Our off-season programming has many of the same goals that every program has in the off-season. We want to build size, strength, and athleticism. Physics plays a large part in football games and there's no disputing that. However, another one of our off-season goals is to continue to develop mental toughness. We are firm believers that the most important thing you train in the weight room is your mind. Can you push past the point where your mind will tell you to stop? Can you endure physical pain to accomplish a goal? These types of questions are answered, and developed in the weight room long before they are put into practice on a Friday night. Our game against Springfield will not only be a physically tough game, but it will also be a mentally tough game. They are a great opponent. We wouldn't have it any other way. Our kids want these types of games. They deserve these types of games because of what they do to prepare for them.

How do you know that the players are ready to play? Has there ever been a time where the team does not have the clarity required to execute the game plan?

Each season is different and each player is different. They all prepare differently. Many prepare a different way than I do. I like to remain calm and quiet before games. I don't like a lot of distractions and I don't like a lot of conversation. I just want to fast-forward the clock and go play. Some of our kids are the same, but some are also different in that they like music, they like to nap, or they want to watch film. Either way, it is easy to see if they are ready to play in how they prepare. Are they engaged during walk-thru and meetings or are they more worried about if their phone is charging? Do they clean up their mess and push their chair in because the little things are important to them or do they just worry about themselves and require babysitting. There's definitely not an equation to solve when determining if a team is ready, but one common denominator is that they are focused and they are present.

Springfield has a very talented team, who are their key players and how do you slow them down?

They have many great players that are a lot of fun to watch play football. They play hard, fast, and violent and we have a tremendous amount of respect for how they play football. They have a couple wide receivers, Thigpen and Brown, that can really break a game open and a new QB that can get them the ball. In my humble opinion, one of the best players on their team is the linebacker, Norman. He flies around, plays violently, and makes a lot of plays. Don't get me wrong, though, they have a lot of great players. Those are just a few to be mentioned. To be successful Friday night, we don't necessarily have to slow anyone down, but rather play as a team. We all have a job to do Friday night and we must control what we can control. Our own job. We all have to be excellent at doing our jobs and the rest is out of our control. Friday night will be a great night of football between two great teams. Two teams that are excited to play in big games. It's going to be a lot of fun and I'm excited to watch our players and coaches go out there and empty the tank.

Springfield bounces back from its first loss to rout Springboro

SPRINGFIELD — There's bouncing back from a difficult loss and then there's the here-we-come-GWOC message Springfield sent Friday night.

The Wildcats did whatever they wanted against a hot Springboro team and Bryce Schondelmyer wowed the homecoming crowd with five deep touchdown passes in a 54-14 victory to reassert themselves as the team to beat in the Greater Western Ohio Conference.

Last week the Division I 10th-ranked Wildcats (5-1, 3-1 GWOC) lost 24-21 to Fairmont.

"Oh yeah, we bounced back for sure," said Schondelmyer, who threw for a career-high 492 yards. "In football, you've got to wait a whole week, so we've just been thinking about that loss. And we came out here and played great."

Their thoughts for now, at least until they start preparing for No. 6 Centerville, will be about the night Schondelmyer and his receivers had, the best rushing night of the season and a defense that kept Springboro's offense off the field.

"It gives us more balance where people can just — they can drop eight if they want to, you can drop nine if you want — but Bryce is making good decisions with the ball and we're not so much trying to blow the lid off every play," Douglass said.

Except when Schondelmyer and Brown — or any other receiver — see what they saw on film that tells them they have one-on-one coverage. Then it is time to go deep.

"You got the top receiver in the state, one of the top receivers in the country, you gotta take a shot to him," Schondelmyer said. "Our guys just did a great job and we had a lot of time to throw. It's a credit to the offensive linemen."

Springboro (5-2, 3-1) was coming off an upset of Centerville and was the only 3-0 team in the GWOC and cracked the state top 10 for the first time at No. 9. Now Springfield, Springboro, Centerville and Wayne are all 3-1.

"The better football team won tonight," Springboro coach Ryan Wilhite said. "Those guys are really, really good and we saw a lot of those things on film. We

Schondelmyer threw touchdown passes of 60, 37 and 33 yards to star receiver Anthony Brown. He also hit Daylen Bradley for 52 yards and Da'Shawn Martin for 45 yards. The touchdowns represented 227 of the passing yards. The Wildcats also played most of the game without Shawn Thigpen, who left after being injured on a reception.

Brown is the highly recruited receiver in the room, but he was able to get open deep on two post routes and one go route because the safeties couldn't ignore the other receivers.

"It's a blessing really," Brown said of the receiver depth. "In our receiver room we have a lot of competition. We all hold ourselves to a high standard."

Schondelmyer completed 22 of 30 and now has 22 touchdowns and 1,869 yards in six games. His previous career high in yards in a game was 425 as a sophomore at Arcanum.

The Wildcats also had their first 100-yard rushing night with 123 for a total offensive output of 615 yards. Jayvin Norman was the workhorse and scored on runs of 3 and 4 yards. The young offensive line of one senior, three sophomores and a freshman played a big role, too. Springfield coach Maurice Douglass said that group is starting to play more like an expe-

were on a high after beating Centerville and wanting to play this game, but we'll regroup and we'll be back. There's still a lot to play for in the league and postseason."

Springfield's defense set the tone with five three-and-outs in the first half and made dual-threat quarterback Evan Ruzzo grind for every first down. Douglass expected the defense to play well, just as it has in recent games against Springboro.

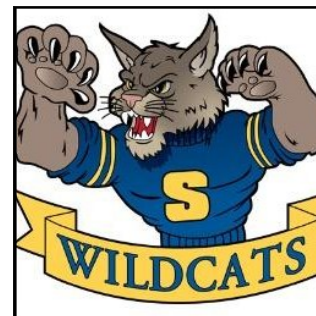
"Because of that, it put us in positions to go out on offense and make plays," Douglass said.

The loss to Fairmont was unexpected and stands out, but the week before Douglass was unhappy with his team's play in a 49-17 victory over last-place Beaver Creek.

"It was a two-week thing," he said. "Sometimes when you've had success, and you have new people in the new positions, they don't know how to handle it. It's about the grind. Every day is a workday. And sometimes you get a little complacent when you have some success, and last week it surfaced all the way because we didn't finish some things that we were supposed to."

The Wildcats played to the finish Friday. With six seconds left, star cornerback Aaron Scott returned an interception for near mid-field for a touchdown.

The Wildcats have won three consecutive regional titles and finished state runner-up a year ago. The Class of 2023 has plenty of motivation and they are zoned in on the team motto, "Run It Back 2022."

When asked what the strengths of his team were, head coach Moe Douglass replied, "team experience and accountability!" The latter says it all about where the Wildcats focus is centered and where their heads are at, as the season approaches. Springfield is locked in!

Jaivian Norman, Sr, ILB – The heart-and-soul of the Wildcats defense and a four-year starter. Norman was outstanding as a junior recording 95 total tackles, 10.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception on his way OPSWA Division I First Team All-Ohio honors. Committed to Eastern Michigan, Norman has 241 total tackles (111 solo), 11.0 sacks, four forced fumbles and three takeaways (one FR, two INTs) in his career.

Anthony Brown, Sr, WR/DB – One of the nation's premier receivers. The speedy Brown was named OPSWA Division I Honorable Mention All-Ohio as a junior after catching 57 balls for 822 yards and seven touchdowns. The Kentucky commit has 99 receptions, 1,693 yards receiving, 2,056 all-purpose yards and 20 touchdowns (16 rec, two rush, one KR, one PR) in his career.

Tyron Barnes, Sr, CB – Had a breakout season on defense in 2021. Barnes tallied 53 total tackles with a sack, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. He was named Second Team All-GWOC (LB) for his efforts. Barnes has an offer from Purdue.

Shawn Thigpen, Sr, WR – A long, lanky target at 6-foot-4, Thigpen is a difficult matchup for defensive backs. He was named Second Team All-GWOC a year ago. Thigpen has 73 receptions, 1,015 yards receiving and eight touchdowns in his career. His offers include Akron, BGSU, Buffalo, Central Michigan, Eastern Kentucky, Eastern Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky, Miami (OH), Ohio, Purdue, Syracuse, Tennessee Tech and Toledo.

Jayvin “Bay Bay” Norman, Jr, TB – Will be the Wildcats go-to guy running the ball this fall. Norman ran for 512 yards and four touchdowns on his way to Special Mention All-GWOC accolades as a sophomore.

Aaron Scott, Jr, CB – One of America’s top defensive backs in the Class of 2024. Scott was a Special Mention All-GWOC selection last fall. He has offers from Boston College, BGSU, Cincinnati, Eastern Kentucky, Eastern Michigan, Georgia Tech, Indiana, Kentucky, UMass, Miami (OH), Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Pitt, Toledo, Vanderbilt and West Virginia.
