The Northmont Thunderbolts fell to the Centerville Elks 34-21 on Friday at Centerville Stadium. While Northmont managed to grab a 14-13 lead midway through the third quarter, they were unable to maintain it as Centerville pulled away by scoring 21 unanswered points until the final minute of the game.

QB Braylon Newcomb breaks into clear last Friday

Quarterback Braylon Newcomb was involved in all five Elk touchdowns, including two runs of 38, and 25 yards. Braylon was the leading rusher, finishing with 125 yards and 98 passing yards for an overall total of 223. Newcomb was 7 for 11 pass attempts, with one touchdown toss and ended the contest with a rating of 168.5, his best of the season.

The offense totaled 289 yards, with 198 coming on the ground and 98 in the air. Nic Bruder wasted no time in scoring his seventh touchdown of the year. He grabbed Braylon Newcomb's four yard bullet and then took it 37 yards, at the 11:02 mark of the first quarter. Nic's run was a thing of beauty as he swerved, dodged, and "broke the ankles" of six defenders on his way to the Northmont endzone. Nic also had an interception return of 28 yards which gave him a total of 103 all-purpose yards. A real good night's work for #2!

Defensively, linebacker Matt Karpinsky recorded 9 tackles to lead the Black Shirts. Reggie Powers and Ross Coppick both added eight stops, overall the defense held Northmont to 249 yards. The Black Shirts pass defense had 4 break-ups and sacked the quarterback 3 times. Freshmen defensive lineman, Brady Seeley saw his first varsity action and made an immediate impact with two tackles.

This Friday, the Monarchs from Marysville make their debut at Centerville Stadium in the second round of the playoffs. This will be the third team from the Ohio Capital Conference that the Elks will face in 2022. Marysville is the 11th seed in Region 2 and upset Dublin Coffman the 6th seed, 28-24 to get this opportunity. They run the Wing-T Offense, that depends heavily on play-action passing and misdirection. They feature a physical, well-coached defense that is disciplined and flies to the ball. The Elks will need a huge turnout to fill Centerville Stadium on the last home game of the season. Please help the boys advance to the next round! EPND.

Inside the Headset





The Elks were to be aware of lessons learned during last week's Northmont game. What lessons do you believe were learned last week?

Only time will tell if you ever, really, truly learned a lesson. In order to actually learn, you have to learn something and live it. Actions always speak louder than words and it never stops. No one is perfect, but the goal is to be better today than you were vesterday. Our team struggled handling outsidefactors last week. A variety of excuses could be used to explain why we came out flat and played flat in the first half. We hope that we learned and got better at handling adversity and changes in our environment. We hope that we learned that the expectation does not change because a variable changes how you approach something. We had a great captains meeting this week. Those young men are phenomenal. They assured us that the lesson was learned and that we will be better and won't have to worry about it in the future. Only time will tell.

This is the first meeting between Centerville and Marysville. What scouting tools and/or communication do you, and your staff utilize for preparation?

We gathered as many games as possible to watch and learn about Marysville. Additionally, we have been reading articles and checking website statistics. We are trying to paint as vivid of a picture of our opponent as we can for our players. We have examined games from previous years to try and see how they are evolving and what they lean on when they are in big games. It's different when you see a team for the first time. It is probably different for them as well. It's refreshing and challenging at the same time. Our players and coaches are really enjoying the preparation for a new team.

Does Marysville feature a more dominant passing or running offense?

Marysville is a wing-T team. The wing-T offense requires discipline and physicality. You have to live it through your entire program. It's very clear that they live it. Their offense will attack you in the run game and exploit your holes in the passing game. They prefer to run the ball first, but they throw the ball very well and often for large chunks of yardage. Their defense matches their offense. They are physical and they play very hard. They get a lot of hats to the ball and they don't give up many big plays. You have to be disciplined and physical to match them. This game will be very similar to Fairmont. Not in scheme, but in physicality and game tempo.

What key Monarch players should fans look for this Friday night?

They have many players that are a lot of fun to watch play football. Particularly, they have a linebacker, #36, that is very physical and makes a lot of plays. They also have some other linebackers that play offense that can change the game on both sides of the ball. You'll see a bunch of players playing both ways.

Both the GWOC and the OCC have 4 teams left in the playoffs. Would you agree, both conferences are in the top in the state and in the nation?

It's been nine years since I coached in the OCC. I know that when I was there it was a very good conference and a lot of the coaches are still in the conference. There's no doubt that there are talented players and talented coaches in the conference. We have the same in the GWOC. I've thought for many years that the GWOC and the OCC should have an agreement to play in the first few weeks of the season. We have played Gahanna-Lincoln and Dublin Coffman. Both have been great opponents for us. If those two are a snapshot of the conference, then there is no doubt that they have a great conference. As for comparing our conferences to the nation, I'd have to say that I really don't know. However, I firmly believe that we play great football in the state of Ohio and would put us up against anyone. We play in a great football state and when you play great teams, everyone elevates each other. It's too hard to compare our state to other states, because we don't have a lot of out-of-state games, but I really believe the GWOC and OCC should be playing each other in football as well as other sports. The competition would be great and we would elevate each other.

Centerville, Springboro win big;

Sophomore quarterback Braylon Newcomb rushed for four touchdowns and passed for another to lead third-seeded Centerville past No. 14 Northmont 34-21 in a Division I, Region 2 playoff opener Friday night. Newcomb scored on runs of 38, 3, 2 and 25 yards and finished with 125 yards on 24 carries. He also had a 41-yard TD pass to Nic Bruder.

Quarterback Cahke' Cortner tossed two TD passes and ran for another to pace Northmont (5-6).

The Elks (8-3) host Marysville next Friday night in a regional quarterfinal.

Late TD lifts Fairmont to playoff win in rematch with GWOC rival Wayne

Firebirds 'got it done' in first home playoff game in school history.

KETTERING — Four weeks ago Fairmont hadn't beaten Wayne in football since 2008. Now the Firebirds have beaten the Warriors twice in 21 days.

Riding running back Drew Baker and an offensive line nicknamed the "Blue Hogs," Fairmont rallied to beat Wayne 24-20 in the opening round of the Division I, Region 2 playoffs at Roush Stadium on Friday. It was the first home playoff game for Fairmont and just its second postseason win in history.

The Firebirds beat Wayne 26-21 in Week 8.

Down 20-17 in the fourth quarter, the Firebirds put together a 13-play, 87-yard drive that was capped by a 1-yard touchdown run by Baker with 1:45 to go. Baker, who became Fairmont's all-time leading rusher last week, carried the ball 12 times on the drive. He finished with 170 yards and three touchdowns on 30 carries.

Fairmont (7-4), the seventh seed, will travel to No. 2 Springfield, a 35-7 winner over Olentangy Orange, in the second round next week. The Firebirds handed the Wildcats their lone loss this season 24-21 in Week 6.

Wayne, seeded 10th, finishes 6-5.

"We just kept saying 'We're going to score, we're going to score,' on the final drive," Baker

said. "We drove it right down their throat. We got it done."

"That's kind of how were supposed to do it," Fairmont head coach Dave Miller said. "Tonight it worked. It was kind of shaky there for a little bit, but we got it done when it mattered."

Wayne took a 20-10 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter on a 23-yard Luke Daulton field goal.

On the ensuing possession Fairmont completed a 49-yard pass on the first snap from Brock Baker to Noah Wilkins. It was the only pass Fairmont attempted in both wins over Wayne. Drew Baker capped the drive with a 1-yard touchdown run with 9:17 to go. Following a Wayne punt, Fairmont began its game-winning drive on its own 13 with 6:22 to play. Baker carried the ball on the last 10 plays.

"We got it done up front," Miller said. "Our offensive line came off the ball, Drew ran hard and Brock made good reads. We got big chunks."

"Our line takes their nickname to heart and they do an awesome job," Drew Baker said. "It's a privilege to run behind them."

Baker heads into next week with 3,625 career rushing yards and 40 rushing touchdowns.

Tyler Adkins interception with 1:22 to play sealed the win.

Fairmont was whistled for just

one penalty - a pass interference call that kept alive a Wayne scoring drive in the third quarter.

Zachariah Williams paced Wayne with 132 yards rushing and a TD on 17 carries. Quarterback Tyrell Lewis completed 11-of-16 passes for 102 yards and a scoring pass to Ka'maurri Smith. The Firebirds outgained Wayne

286-279 in total yards.

Fairmont is in the playoffs for the sixth time in school history and fifth time under Miller.

"Our mindset this year is that we're going to compete and beat every one that comes at us," Drew Baker said. "Every opponent is a monster. But we can play with any of them."

Marysville advances with win vs. Coffman

Marysville ended a 40-year drought by rallying past the host Dublin Coffman 28-24 in a Division I, Region 2 firstround game.

Marysville last defeated Coffman 13-0 in 1982, with the Shamrocks now holding a 26-4 edge in the series. The 11th-seeded Monarchs improved to 7-4 and will play Friday at third-seeded Centerville (9-2), which defeated 14th-seeded Clayton Northmont 34-21.

Marysville led 21-7 before sixth-seeded Coffman scored 17 consecutive points to take a 24-21 lead with 9:45 left. After totaling 12 first downs in the first half, Marysville managed just one in the second half before the winning drive.

"I pulled the guys in and said that they could either tuck their tails or go win the game," Marysville coach Brent Johnson said. "They went down and scored and then we got a big stop (defensively)."

Marysville went 80 yards in 11 plays for the decisive score, a 6-yard run by Nascere Smith. The running back rushed for 91 yards on eight carries. Colton Powers scored three touchdowns in the first half for the Monarchs.

"We both kept punching and swinging and it came down to who had the most heart," said Powers, who finished with 123 yards on 16 carries.

"Our team has a lot of heart, and we never give up."

Coffman's Carson Cox rushed for touchdowns of 1 and 4 yards, and quarterback Quinn Hart connected with tight end Braden Dougherty for a 20-

yard score on a fourth-and-11 play with 18 seconds left in the first half.

"We were just out-coached, outphysicaled, out-toughed and out-disciplined all night long," said Coffman coach Geron Stokes, whose team finished 7-4.

Hilliard Davidson 17, Grove City 7

Coach Jeremey Scally called his team's win at Grove City on Oct. 28 "oldschool Davidson football."

Keevan Gibbon rushed for 142 yards and a touchdown on 26 carries, and the 11th-seeded Wildcats dominated time of possession in beating sixth-seeded Grove City.

"As long as we're chewing it up on offense then (Grove City quarterback Matthew) Papas has to sit on the sidelines and wait until his next possession," Scally said. "If we're three-and-out all the time then he chucks it up and they're going to score their 40-something points. Our plan was basic, really simple, just try to execute at a high level and keep their offense off the field as long as we could — old-school Davidson football."

Davidson, which also defeated Grove City 7-3 on Aug. 26, improved to 5-6 and will visit third-seeded New Albany in a

CENTERVILLE'S BRUDER: 'DYNAMIC' PLAYMAKER

CENTERVILLE – Some day when he's a doctor – maybe every day – Nic Bruder will remember the open field.

The memory might be a pass, an interception or a punt return. He might recall a diving stop of a hard ground ball to his right or a line drive to the gap for a stand-up double.

Bruder does all these things for the Centerville football and baseball teams. Put him anywhere: wide receiver, strong safety, kick returner, shortstop, third base, pitcher's mound.

"I like playing all the positions," he said. "I love wide receiver. I love DB. I love returning punts. I just like being in the open field being able to make plays."

Third-seeded Centerville (9-2) reached the second round of the Division I, Region 2 football playoffs and a meeting at home tonight at 7 against No. 11 Marysville on the strength of many talented players. Bruder is but one of them, but he is involved in almost every play.

Bruder never comes off the field on defense, is out there for every punt and kickoff return and plays about 75% of the offensive snaps.

"Guys like him don't come around every year," Elks coach Brent Ullery said. "I wish I could put my finger on what makes him so good, because I'd tried to coach it from my other guys if I could."

Bruder's numbers tell a lot of the story. He is the team's second-leading receiver with 29 catches and first in yards with 498. He tied for second in the Greater Western Ohio Conference with four interceptions. He averages 16.5 yards on punt returns and 19.1 on kickoff returns. And he is the Elks' leading scorer with nine touchdowns: six receiving, one rushing, one punt return, one interception.

As a sophomore, Bruder caught seven passes, didn't play defense and returned only four punts.

His role grew last year when Ullery asked more players to play both ways. Bruder caught 30 passes, including six touchdowns, and made three interceptions.

"One of his best characteristics is he's super uber competitive," Ullery said. "There's nothing he doesn't want to try to do. And there's nothing that he doesn't think he can't do."

Bruder said he's always competed with his siblings and enjoys being competitive with his friends away from the fields doing things like disc golf. But on the field he says it's his teammates that allow him to succeed.

"I understand that I have guys around me that are even better than me at their position," he said. "It's nice knowing that if I do my job 100% of the time, I know that they're going to do their job even more to help me out."

On offense, Ullery said the game plan every week involves new ways to get Bruder the ball.

"He was really good last year," Ullery said. "We had no idea he was going to keep getting better and better this year. We come up with something new every week to try to get him the ball because he's just so dynamic."

Ullery said Bruder's growth as a defender is helped because he uses his offensive knowledge to anticipate what the opponents will do.

"He just flourished, because he's so smart, and so competitive, and he's able to put himself in positions to be very successful," Ullery said. "When you're as good as he is and you're as confident as he is, the game happens in slow motion."

As a returner, Bruder has been a game-changer, especially in the season finale victory over Wayne.

"This year he's just a menace back there," Ullery said. "He's always finding little holes and making extra yards. And he's a threat to make a big play every time."

Football recruiters, mostly from Division II and III programs, used to inquire about Bruder. But several months ago he said baseball is his future. He leaves open a small window to football if it's at the MAC level and suits his educational goals of pre-med. But baseball is his focus right now.

He likes Adrian in Michigan, a Division III school. He has an offer from Division II Maryville in St. Louis and has heard from a school in Arizona.


"I really do love football, and I really do love baseball, and it's made it a hard decision," Bruder said. "I'm not opposed to playing football in college at a higher level. But I do feel like over my life, I've kind of fell in love with baseball more."







Elks' Delaney the difference

"Tom Delaney."

That name was the only answer Fairmont West Coach Dick Hoppe had for any questions about what happened after his team lost to Centerville, 33-0, Friday night.

The victory was Centerville's 21st straight over three years, ninth in a row this season. The Elks also earned at least a tie for the Western Ohio League title for the third straight year as a crowd of 7,500 watched the game at Fairmont Stadium.

Delaney, who stands 5-foot-10, 170pounds, is the Centerville quarterback. He ran for 113 yards and one touchdown, completed nine of 15 passes for 104 yards and another score and directed the Elks to scores on five of their first seven possessions.

"He makes the difference between an average and exceptional ball club." said Hoppe. "He beat us more than anyone else on their club. They'd be in the hole and he'd scramble and get them out. He came up with the big play all night. He's a fine athlete and was the difference."

So, Tom Delaney, what about all this praise?

"I just look for the openings. In the last three games, our line has been blocking so well that the holes are there. Tonight they were super. I think we've gained confidence in each other as the season has gone along. I think we've gotten better each week. We just really had it all together tonight."

THE ONLY PROBLEM was that Centerville Coach Bob Gregg may have left his regulars in a bit too long. Although substitutions were made, Delaney and many of the regulars were in with two minutes left in the game and Centerville was passing the football. But what's a little attempt at running up the score between a pair of rivals?

"Delaney has had better games this year, but he did a good job tonight," said Gregg. "He's as quick a quarterback as I've ever seen in high school. He got out of some situations tonight because of it. That offensive line gave him some help. They controlled the line and really blew them out."

Centerville needs a victory over Springfield North next Friday to clinch the WOL title outright. "We're not going to have any of this sharing business," shouted Gregg. "We've already had that once and it won't happened again. We'll be ready next week."




